Hello Tennis Friends,

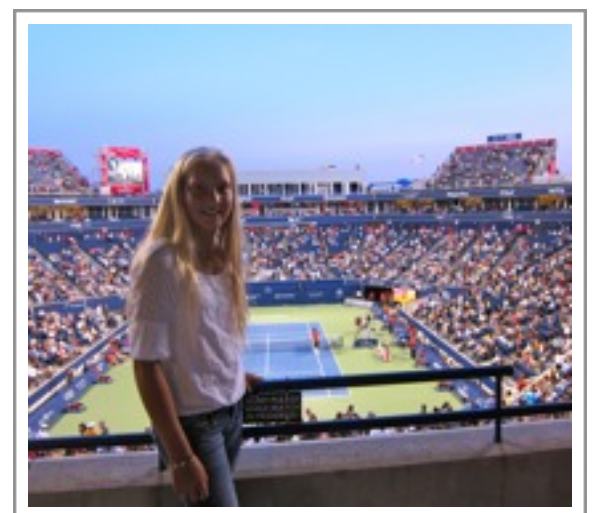
Congratulations to Charlotte Petrick for two wonderful weeks of competition at the Canadian U18 Championships in Toronto and the Canadian U16 Championships in Laval Quebec.

She has two silver medals for doubles, a bronze medal for U16 singles, and a 4th place finish for U18 singles to show for it. In each event, it was Gloria Liang who got the best of Charlotte in the singles, with tough 3-set matches being played each time. It's easy to forget Charlotte is still only 14 years of age!

The most exciting day of the two weeks had to be the medal matches for the U18 Championships, as they were played on Court 4 at the Rogers Cup last Friday. The players had all the trappings of the regular tournament, and Charlotte's match attracted a big crowd. Later in the evening, she had a bird's eye view of Serena Williams and Lucy Safarova from a suite above center court.

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AROUND THE ROGERS CUP(S)

It's great that so many players from the Niagara Peninsula make their way to the Rogers Cup tournaments every year. Perhaps one day someone will organize a bus expedition. This year two keen players attended the Montreal tournament for the first time and came back with rave reviews. We had a fabulous time: 26 hours worth of tennis spectating in 2 days, including Dodig beating Nadal in the 2nd round, Tsonga beating Federer in the 3rd round, the Murray brothers, the Bryan brothers, Nestor and some hotblooded spaniards (Lopez and Verdasco) in some fast action doubles games, Djokovic winning against Davydenko and Cilic, and a great game between Fish and Lopez (11pm till 1.30am). Janice was able to find the best seats in the shade and a great angle to watch the games. We all came to the conclusion that next time we go, it will have to be for at least a week!

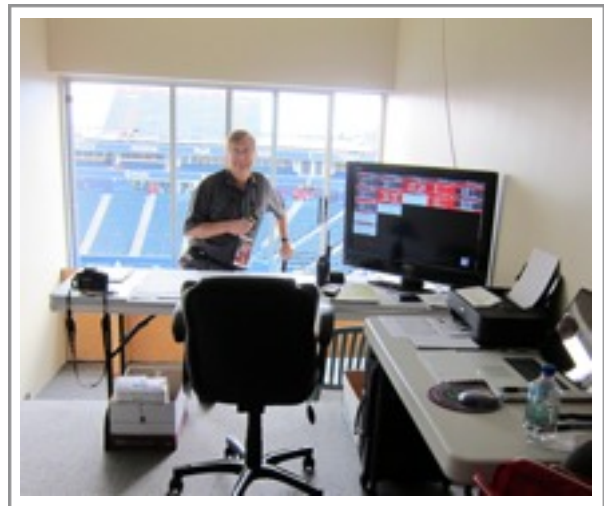

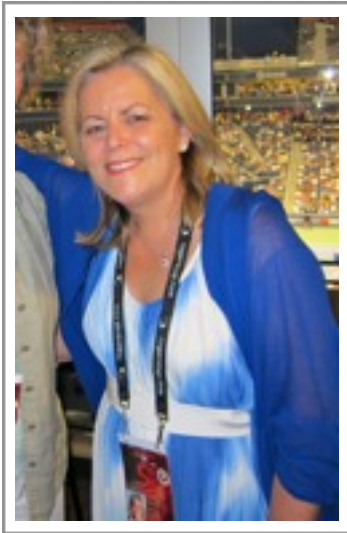

STACEY ALLISTER ... A VERY SPECIAL PERSON



If you want to be inspired, Stacey Allister is a great place to start. She shows us it's possible to achieve anything we set our minds and hearts to.

It all started in 1975, when a 12-year-old was chosen from a schools program for a summer scholarship at the Welland Tennis Club. She had shown hustle and persistence that stood out from the other kids, so the club offered her a racquet, a junior membership and some lessons. Four years later, Stacey was running the Junior Program at the club - learning as she went, trying new ideas, never afraid to fail.

Today, Stacey is the most prominent female sports executive in the world and one of the most influential people in the world of tennis. She's the Chair and CEO of the WTA Tour, guiding the women's professional game through these turbulent economic times.

How do you do that ... how do you go from there to there? Stacey says : "Don't let anyone tell you something can't be accomplished." And for a leader, no task is too small to have her attention. Stacey is a remarkable leader, inspiring great loyalty and admiration from those on her team.

On Saturday night, she was honored alongside Andre Agassi as inductees in the Rogers Cup Hall of Fame. In the tribute video shown on the big screen above center court, the Welland Tennis Club had a starring role, including Al Dizenzo, Stacey's partner for the club mixed doubles championship. Did those club members have any idea where this young player's career would lead?

Stacey's strengths would likely have taken her to the top in whatever path she set out on. It was fortunate for Tennis that a small community club had the foresight to establish an outreach program, to search for talent and to provide an environment in which that special ability could develop and grow. Who knows what other talent is waiting to be discovered in the Niagara Peninsula. We hope our community clubs will be inspired by Stacey Allister's story and take our great game to all our schools and neighborhoods.



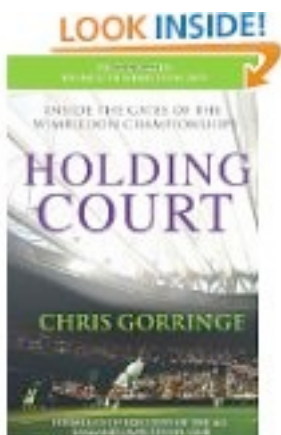
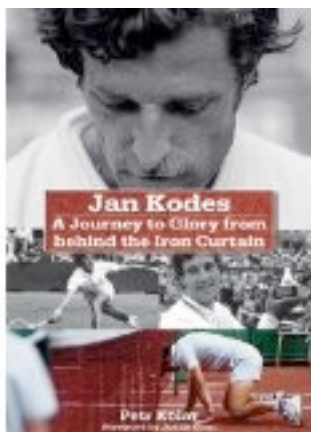
*The Center Court ceremony : Stacey Allister, with her daughter Alexandra, her son Jack, and her husband John Milkovich

The second inspiration was to see they could care about something as simple as our little tennis endeavor in the park. Although it would have been nice to show them something more in keeping with general expectations of a facility in Niagara-on-the-Lake, they were nevertheless interested in what we had and how it was managed.

They all care about Tennis in a big-picture way, have been involved in development projects of all kinds, and know what it takes to make big things happen against all the odds. The spirit of their visit will live on, and we hope one day we'll have a Niagara-on-the-Lake Tennis Club to which we could invite them for a match.



Jan Kodes is the 1973 Wimbledon champion, the 1970 and 1971 French Open champion, the 1971 and 1973 US Open finalist, 1980 Davis Cup champion, and was inducted into the International Tennis Hall of Fame in 1990.

Chris Gorringe CBE, was CEO of the All-England Club from 1979-2005. His wife Jenny is an avid tennis player, enjoying county team competition.

Don Goodwin has been the voice of the Rogers Cup for 33 years, was the voice of the 1996 Olympic Games in Atlanta, was a leader of the Canadian Olympic Teams in 1972 in Munich and 1976 in Innsbruck.

John Beddington directed the Canadian Open Tennis Championships as chairman, as director, and as executive vice president of Tennis Canada from 1979-1995. He remains involved in many tennis projects including the yearend Masters Cup in London England.
